How to use this list

Hey! These are the 100 Write-From-Dictation sentences reported as **most repeated** in recent PTE exams. Ten sentences a day is the sweet spot — here's the 4-step routine we recommend for each one:

1. Listen first, pen down

Play the sentence once and just listen — no typing yet. Try to catch the overall meaning. If you understand what the sentence is *about*, your brain fills the gaps much faster.

2. Chunk it

Don't try to hold 12 words at once — nobody can. Break the sentence into 2–4 word chunks ("the results of / the study / were surprising") and repeat each chunk in your head like a mini echo.

3. Type it out

Write the full sentence from memory. Then tick the checkbox next to it. One honest attempt beats reading the list ten times — your memory is a muscle, and typing is the workout.

4. Review the small words

Here's the secret: most lost points come from tiny words — **a, the, is, of, to, in** — and missing plural **s** endings. That's why we've **bolded** them in every sentence below. When you check your answer, compare the bold parts first.

Tip: the sentences are grouped by target score band. If you're aiming for 65, master the 65 and 50 groups first, then treat the 79 group as your stretch zone. You've got this.

• Target 79 band — 51 sentences

The tough ones — longer, denser, more academic. Master these and nothing on test day will surprise you.
